



High Tech Theatres and Sterilising Services

New technology in the Acute Services Building will have a dramatic impact on the Peri-Operative Suite and the Sterilising Services Unit, (SSU). The Peri-Operative Suite will have six (6) Operating Theatres and two (2) Procedure Rooms.

Wagga Wagga Base Hospital Acting Perioperative Suite Manager, Jo Johnston said theatres are being designed for future needs to allow for more complex cases. "Live digital streaming enables specialists to consult with each other. It also means we can offer new opportunities for surgeons and theatre staff to observe and to teach anywhere across the country."

One of the things that astounds staff when they go to the current building site is the size of the new theatres, Ms Johnston said. "It is much bigger than they expect," she said. "Staff are also very excited that the theatre floor will have a balcony. This is a new feature that they love because so much of their day is spent inside and to have a balcony is a wonderful feature," she said. Ms Johnston said staff are also excited about the skylights that will see natural light stream into the Recovery Unit.

The Sterilising Services Unit (SSU) in the Acute Services Building is also set to expand. Manager of the Sterilising Services Unit, Mary-Ann Kelly said the unit is responsible for processing all theatre equipment, collecting, washing and sterilising then wrapping and sending it to the Peri-Operative Suite and to other outlying facilities. "The new

hospital will see an upgrade of our processes with the creation of a one-way central workflow," Ms Kelly said.

One of the new elements the SSU is most proud of, is its new "Loans Room" which will be a first for sterilisation services. "It will be a specific room where equipment can be checked and washed using a separate new pass-through washer and separate steriliser," Ms Kelly said. "It's called a Loans Room because the equipment is on loan due to the complexity of the surgical cases."

The equipment in the SSU will be upgraded to include:

- Five new washers.
- Two current steam sterilisers to be upgraded to four high-tech steam sterilisers.
- One current Plasma Steriliser to be upgraded to two.
